In today's world there is no escaping the substantial impact social media plays in our lives. Millions of people look to their personal computer, tablet, or phone several times a day for the latest update, post, or news story. Information is good...but accurate information is better.



•Do you need a police rumor clarified? Did you see police cars down the block or at the corner business and wonder what occurred? We are here to help and can often clear up rumors about a police incident over the telephone. With the popularity of social media access we have also seen an increase in the passing along of crime related information or police happenings. Social media users within Wauwatosa often share information amongst their "group" for the purpose of community safety. This practice has become so popular that the Wauwatosa Police Department now has a Facebook page and Twitter account! Like we said earlier, information is good, but let's talk about inaccurate information for a minute.

Inaccurate information posted about a crime related incident could cause an overreaction or for that matter an under reaction. If you see police activity for yourself or hear of an incident occurring, please consider the following tips before posting the information:

- Do you know all the facts? If not that is ok. Keep your post straight forward and refer to "police activity in the area" or "roads blocked off in the area". This will still be a benefit to your friends and neighbors but will not cause any misunderstanding.

If you see a crime in progress, believe a crime has just occurred, or suspect a crime is about to occur, please dial 911 for immediate assistance. Also take the time to "like" us on Facebook. Although we do not necessarily post "in progress" incident updates all that often, we have posted in the past and will likely post in the future as determined necessary.

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Safety Update



The Community Support Division of the Wauwatosa Police Department was present at the Annual CJPNA Business Meeting on November 4, 2015. Laura Laurishke (Administrative Support Specialist) and two officers graciously talked for about an hour about the community and ways to make our neighborhood safer.

They discussed Neighborhood Watches, which they explained were block based. Each block should have a captain whose only responsibility is to help hand out a quarterly newsletter. The newsletter is produced by the community support division and informs neighbors of services and special events being offered by the police department. They emphasized what an important role neighbor's play in crime prevention through observation. If you have any question about who is your block captain or about starting a watch program on your block, contact the Community Support Division at 414-471-8430 ext. 5111.

They reported on crime in the past year, which included 10 burglaries (4 business, 4 garage, and 2 residencies). Stating that some suspects had been arrested and others were being watched closely, believing the business burglaries were committed by the same person. Happy to report there have been no reported incidences since August. The police strongly encouraged everyone to lock car doors and not leave cars running to warm up during cold weather.

Another take away from the meeting was about the importance of reporting suspicious behavior. They encouraged use of the non-emergency number (414.471.8430) to report anything unusual or suspicious. They emphasized that you should not feel as if you are bothering them and call with any concerns. They also encouraged all to place the dispatch number (414.471.8444) in your cell phones for emergencies, as this will bypass the need to go through 911 and the sheriff's office for a faster response. And if you do witness a crime, the most useful pieces of information are: type of car, any part of license plate, type of voice, clothing, and time of event.

They do believe crime is low in our neighborhood because we have a close-knit community and it is easier to pick up on abnormal activities

when you know each other's routines. Continue to communicate with your neighbors and remember to report anything out of the usual to keep our neighborhood safe.

Produced quarterly by the Community Support Division, this newsletter informs citizens of services and special events being offered by the Police Department.

Tosa Skatepark News

The Tosa Skatepark in Hart Park officially opened on November 7th and has been busy ever since, thanks to the recent warm weather. This city-owned park is a result of years of fundraising by Tosa Skateboarders United, a nonprofit organization started in 2004 by a group of neighborhood boys. Generous support by the City of Wauwatosa, an anonymous donor, Landmark Healthcare Facilities LLC, community civic groups, local businesses, and hundreds of individuals finally completed the funding. The state of the art custom concrete Tosa Skatepark opened with rave reviews. The park features both "transition areas" (bowl, quarter-pipe, etc) and "street" skating areas (ledges, stairs, rails) and has elements for beginner and advanced riders. Young children should be supervised while using the Tosa Skatepark and protective gear, including helmets, is recommended for all riders. A formal dedication ceremony will take place in the spring of 2016.



The approximately 8,000 sq ft park is open dawn to dusk, weather permitting and is all wheel-friendly, meaning skateboards, bmx bikes, inline rollerblades and scooters are welcome. Tosa Skateboarders United continues to exist and will work as an advisory group for the skatepark operations. Personalized bricks are still being offered for sale to help finance the park. 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Business Spotlight: Simmas Bakery

Simma's Bakery, a long time CJPNA Business Member and recognized as one of the best bakeries in not only Wisconsin but in the United States, is expanding. Owners Mark and Peggy Carocco are very excited about the expansion and are looking forward to their grand re-opening sometime in February.



The Carocco's purchased Simma's in 2011 from the daughter of the original owner, Simma herself. Simma immigrated to Wauwatosa from Russia in 1979 and then started the bakery three years later. Last year, the building owner, who also operated the Frame It Gallery, decided to retire and was looking to sell the building which was built in 1927. The Carocco's, feeling the need to expand their space, purchased the building.

The Uniform shop moved 1 door south to occupy the Frame It's vacated space and Simma's took over the space directly south of their existing store.

Simma's caters to three customer bases: The retail / walk in business makes up about 45% of their sales, the wedding and special occasions portion makes up about 35% of sales and their wholesale business, selling to the likes of Sendik's and some of Milwaukee's finest restaurants makes up the remaining 20%. Mark and Peggy recognized the need for a larger, more private space for their wedding and special occasions customers where they could discuss their special order in relative privacy.

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What's Happening in Tosa?

Throughout 2015, a nationally-renowned design team hired by the city has held public input meetings to present updates of the developing Village "streetscaping" project and gather citizen opinions. These meetings were followed by meetings with representatives of village businesses, the Milwaukee County Transit System, the city's Parks Board, and the city's Department of Public Works. The process has been overseen by an ad hoc Streetscape Steering Committee, the members of which are the Mayor; citizens with special expertise in engineering, architecture, and urban planning; city staff members; and three aldermen (including me).

The project pulls together various concepts and forms them into a coherent overall plan. The components include: choices of street furniture, lighting, landscaping, pavement treatments, and signage; renovation and improvement of Root Common and the Pocket Park; intersection improvements that will accommodate multi-modal transit options (cars, trucks, and buses, including the possibility of a "bus rapid transit" line) and improvements to safety for pedestrians and other users. (The intersections affected include Harmonie/Harwood; State/Wauwatosa; Harwood/Wauwatosa; State/Harwood; Underwood/State; and Wauwatosa/Harwood.) Even more basic are plans to replace water and sewer mains that date back to 1897.

At its meeting on December 1, 2015, the Common Council approved the city's capital improvements budget for the years 2016 through 2020. Included in the budget is approximately \$15 million to complete the improvements to the Village. This will protect and preserve Wauwatosa's historic economic center for another generation.

Cutting Taxes

A few years ago, the Legislature capped property tax levies. This has made it extremely hard for cities to maintain current service levels. Each year, because of the tax cap and inflation, it becomes harder to find the money we need. The only way out of this box has been to work hard to redevelop old industrial properties that were vacant or had outlived their usefulness. Not every municipality has been able to do this. But Wauwatosa, because of its strategic location and our efforts to work with developers, has fared better. Had we not done so, our tax base wouldn't be big enough to continue to provide the city services – police, fire, and public works – that we all expect.

One under-performing site was on State Street between 74th Street and Wauwatosa Avenue. Currently, the land is worth about \$2 million. Ground is about to be broken on the new State Street Station project there. When that project is built, it will be worth over \$30 million, and provide funds for the tax incremental financing district, which will help to pay for the needed Village improvements.

By redeveloping property, which is not being put to its "highest and best use," the city is preserving public services – and actually reducing the city's property tax rate. Through a combination of hard work, careful planning, and good fortune, the city's 2015 property tax rate has decreased \$.06 per \$100 of assessed value compared to 2014, a decrease of 0.3%.

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Our Neighborhood Olympian • Hailey Danisewicz

Former CJPNA resident Hailey Danisewicz, daughter of Michael and Gigi, has qualified for the 2016 Paralympic Games. Hailey will be competing in the triathlon race, which will be held in September in Rio de Janeiro. She qualified for this event by winning the triathlon test event that was held in Rio this past August.

Hailey is an above knee amputee, as she lost her leg while battling cancer in 2005. She has been competing in triathlons since 2011, and won the Paralympic World Championship in 2013. This is the first year that triathlon will be a Paralympic event.

Hailey attended Jefferson, Longfellow, and graduated from Wauwatosa East in 2009. She earned her Bachelor's degree from Northwestern University in 2013, and currently resides in Chicago where she trains full time.

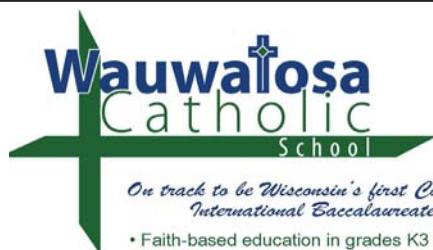

This expansion will allow them to accomplish this, and more.

The expansion will double their space to about 5,200 sq. ft. when completed in February. The existing space will house the wedding/special occasion meeting areas as well as remain a production facility. The new space will be the retail sales area, as well as expanded production in the rear of the building. There will be a larger display case, additional customer ordering stations and more seating. A customer restroom will also be added.

The Carocco's are also looking to expand their product offerings to include gourmet ice creams made at UW Madison's Babcock Hall as well as fresh croissants which are made by their other bakery business located in Greendale. Peggy said that they are looking to sell home made pot pies with a croissant crust which she described as "out of this world."

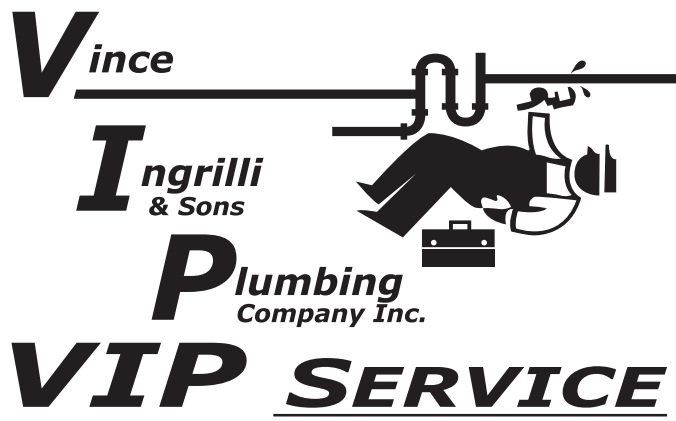
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
