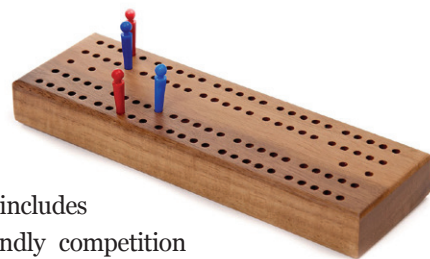

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Milwaukee T-Shirt Co. finds CJPNA a Great Fit

Although the new storefront opened just a few weeks ago, Milwaukee T-Shirt Co. owner Dan Zarwell looks right at home in the 800 block of N. 68th St. in Wauwatosa (the former home of Janus Yoga and Massage). Natural light fills the space, accenting his variety of T-shirts, as well as his original photographs and Cream City Candles.

Zarwell also has a graphics and design business, Pen Station LTD., that was originally started by his father back in 1982 and was located at N. 118th St. and Bluemound. Zarwell now operates the design business in the back, behind the T-shirt business. His main client for the design business is Miller Coors, but he is hoping to diversify.

He began the T-shirt business online, and decided the time was right to open a retail location. Zarwell and his family live in the Washington Heights neighborhood; he chose Wauwatosa's Jacobus Park neighborhood, for what he hopes will be an ideal location to involve the area community.

The store boasts a variety of pre-printed T's, but Zarwell also designs and prints shirts to order in small or large batches. He screen-prints the shirts off location in Menomonee Falls.

In the future, Zarwell would like to attract people to the shop with activities like vintage video games, and hopes to become involved with local festivals such as Tosa Fest.

Another graphic design company has moved into the space next door to Milwaukee T-Shirt Co., which Zarwell views it as a collaboration rather than competition, adding that he thinks the two businesses can complement each other.

Zarwell has a passion for photography and sells his prints online and in the store. In addition to freelance clients, he photographs vintage cars, buildings and animals at the zoo.

The November 6 election will determine several key state offices, including Governor, U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative, Wisconsin State Senate seats, and Wisconsin Assembly seats. There's also a referendum on Tosa School Facilities. Are you registered to vote? Check your status at <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/MyVoterInfo>

If you're not yet registered, see below to learn about your options and key deadlines. Remember, all voters must provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote by mail, in-person in the clerk's office, or at the polls on Election Day.

- October 17, 2018- Deadline to register by mail and to vote online.
- November 2, 2018 @ 5:00 p.m. - Deadline to register at the Municipal Clerk's office (7725 W. North Avenue).
- November 6, 2018 from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
Register to vote at your polling place.

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Tosa Green Summer Brings New Meaning to “Barrel Party”

ON A WEEKDAY AFTERNOON in late June, four folks from the Tosa Green Summer team came out to my house for a “Rain Barrel Party”!

The team provided sandwich platters, fruit and sweets from Tosa Bowl and Bun, and delivered an informative 30-minute presentation to two dozen neighbors on the benefits of rain barrels. The team provided an installation demonstration at my house, propping up a tan barrel on two split-faced cinder blocks and adding a diverter kit to my gutter, allowing water to fill the barrel, then proceed out of the gutter.

Tosa Green Summer was a summer-long MMSD initiative helping local residents explore what it takes to install green infrastructure like the one they installed at my house. Green infrastructure can play a big role in helping Wauwatosa residents improve water quality in our rivers and Lake Michigan, reduce the likelihood of flooding and basement backups, beautify our neighborhoods and keep costs manageable.

The program is all wrapped up now, and Wauwatosa neighborhoods received more than 200 rain barrels, 4 rain gardens and 40,000 square feet of soil amendments. You can keep up with Tosa Green Summer on Facebook and email the team at TosaGreenSummer@gmail.com. ■

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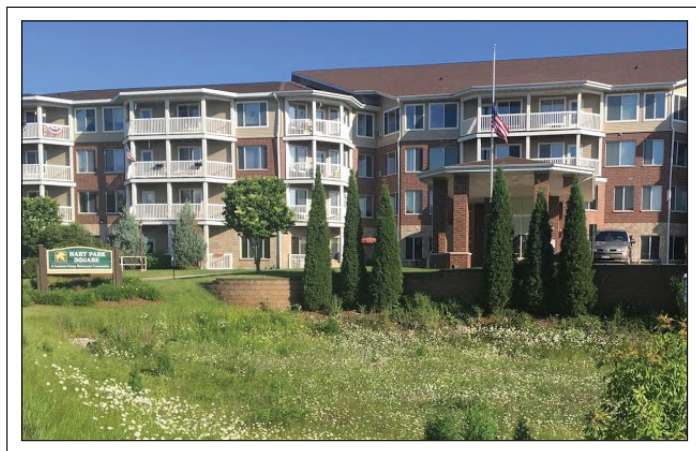
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Helping older adults and their families manage the challenges of aging

Most of us have heard the adage: use it or lose it when it comes to memory loss. Learning how to avoid memory loss as a senior is a central concern for many of us as our loved ones and even ourselves as we grow older. Completing crossword puzzles, playing card games and other tasks requiring some mental muscle are all worth pursuing, but staying active socially may be even more important for brain health.

A study conducted by the Harvard School of Public Health (and reported in the *New York Times*) finds that maintaining an active social life appears to delay memory loss as we age. Being social keeps one mentally engaged, in a way distinct from completing crossword or Sudoku puzzles. Social isolation may be an important risk factor for cognitive decline.

Over the course of the six year study, individuals, who in their 50s and 60s engaged in a lot of social activity, also had the slowest rate of memory decline. When compared to those who were the least socially active, the most socially active had less than half



the rate of memory loss. The study has implications for seniors living alone. Dr. Lisa F. Berkman, the study's senior author observes that simply visiting seniors does not make them socially engaged. "It's not about support, it's about being completely

engaged and participating in our society.”

Participants did not have to be married or surrounded by family to benefit from social engagement. Seniors engaged in all sorts of networks, friends, fellow volunteers, people at church, card or book clubs, other residents in a retirement community, benefitted from social engagement.

How to Avoid Memory Loss as a Senior

If you or a loved could use some new ideas to get active, here are a few ideas. Remember that hearing loss can make being social difficult. A check-up and hearing aids could make a world of difference for your loved one.

- Learn a new skill or language. Community colleges and senior recreation cen-

ters are a source of inexpensive classes in everything from Spanish, art, and swimming, to novel writing and computers.

- Take up yoga or join a gym. In addition to improving overall fitness, the local gym or YMCA can be a great place to make new friends.

- Attend free lectures at bookstores and museums. Find new interests or hobbies by listening to visiting artists.

- Volunteer at the local library or a nonprofit agency. There are many different volunteer opportunities that require varying commitments of time. Ask if help is needed.

- Don't stop walking as you get older. Find a way to help keep up the habit. Finding a walking buddy, or walkabout group are both good options. Walk buddies can be particularly helpful to keep up the pace when walking has to move inside

a shopping mall for the winter months.

Staying active and involved is one of the key benefits of living in a senior community. In addition to scheduled activities such as group exercise, choir, art classes and trips to theatre and movies, senior communities make it easy to find a foursome for bridge without traveling far from home. ■

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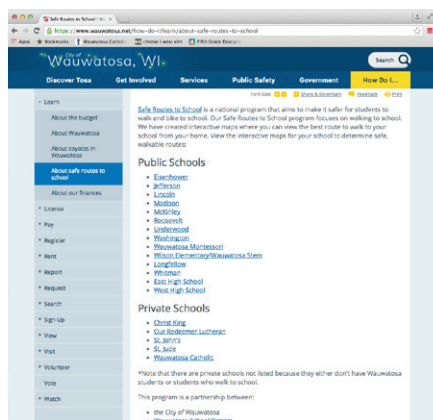
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Back to School, Back to Safety

» **THIS MONTH, WAUWATOSA STUDENTS** headed back to school, many of them on foot—or on a bike. Whether you have a student attending a local school, or whether your commute takes you past one, it's vital to be on the lookout for children, crossing guards and crosswalks.

Part of a national campaign, Wauwatosa's Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program aims to make it safer for students to walk and bike to school by giving families recommended routes that have been evaluated and deemed safe by our team of professionals. Using a Geographic Information System (GIS), the team evaluated variables including optimal routes to school, student housing density, locations of crossing guards and other safety equipment, traffic counts, speed, and accidents.



Want to see an interactive map tool that identifies safe walking routes from your house to your school? It's easy, and only four steps!

1. Go to wauwatosa.net/safe-route.
2. Select your child's school.
3. Type your home address into the search bar.
4. Follow the arrows on the map to your school.

You'll see where crossing guards are located, the no parking zone on certain streets around your school, and the drop off zone, sometimes called hug-and-go. ■

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
